Clinical Question/Rhythm


Last month I asked if you could identify this rhythm and I would provide the answer this month.



My systematic interpretation of this rhythm is: rhythm is slightly irregular, rate is 70 bpm, P waves are present however, some are peaked, some are inverted and one rounded, PR interval varies with different P waves, QRS duration is normal.

Answer: Wandering atrial pacemaker (WAP).
